SPRING, with its universal call to outdoors, has returned, and the motorist again is first to heed its beckoning.


The annual hegira from Palm Beach and other Southern resorts is bringing the fashionable folk back to town and country houses.





MUCH of the enjoyment that a motorist derives from his car depends upon the quality of what is generally known as the "service" furnished by the company selling the car.


